

Here are some curriculum options for the GDP students to help them achieve their goals!






Here's what I'm thinking

What is needed to sell "Oh Okadai", a Japanese sake made from rice produced at Okayama University, to the world? To answer this question, I started studying rice production and brewing basics at the School of Agriculture using the Matching Track. I have also been studying international trade and business administration in English since my junior year. In the future, I would like to work on sake production that also incorporates specific marketing plans.

Learning in both Japanese and English prepared me for international business!





Discovery Track

Students will study their desired topic in various fields of arts and sciences under the guidance of the Discovery faculty. Students build their learning path based on the courses they have taken in their first year and the linguistic skills they have cultivated through their language education.





The most appealing aspect of the Discovery Track is that students can study in the various fields of arts and sciences, such as sociology, political science, economics, and environmental chemistry, with peers with diverse backgrounds from all over the world. For example, in a class where students discuss "colonialism," they can hear directly from their classmates from countries that had been colonized in the past and learn about the history and feelings of people from those countries. Stories from some distant world known only in textbooks are realized and students are made aware of new perspectives that vary immensely depending on the country and environment in which they grew up. Only at GDP you can experience this multifaceted kind of learning - gaining knowledge and sharing your opinions with others from multiple viewpoints, deepening your learning and, ultimately, finding the subject you truly wish to explore.

Tuition fees at Japanese national universities are very affordable compared to European or USA universities and private universities in Japan. The annual tuition fee of JPY 535,800 is paid in two installments of JPY 267,900. All fees are the same regardless of GDP, other schools/faculty, or whether you are a Japanese or international student. In addition, students who study abroad at partner universities through EPOK, Okayama University's exchange program, can study abroad without paying tuition fees to the partner universities.

Frequently Asked Questions and Answers



How does the Discovery Program for Global Learners (GDP) differ from other undergraduate schools/faculty?

GDP is an undergraduate program that offers the equivalent of a Bachelor's degree. Upon graduation, students receive a Bachelor of Arts degree, which is referred to as the Bachelor of Arts and Sciences in English. Even if you choose the Matching Track and complete your Senior Project in another school/faculty, you will still be considered a graduate of GDP and will receive a Bachelor of Arts and Sciences.

Can I graduate in four years even if I choose to study abroad?

If the credits earned in your study abroad program are recognized as graduation requirement credits, studying abroad for six months to one year may not affect your graduation date. However, some fields require students to complete a full year of experiments and practical training in order to conduct their Senior Project, so the timing and duration of study abroad must be carefully planned and considered in advance.

I have passed the Practical English Proficiency Test (EIKEN) Grade 2, can I apply for the Domestic Application? Can I be exempted from the English writing test?

Yes, you may apply. For the Practical English Proficiency Test (EIKEN), the EIKEN CSE score will be used instead of the passing or failing grade. Please refer to the Application Guidelines for Comprehensive Selection for details regarding other applicable examinations, CEFR equivalent levels, expiration dates, etc. If you meet the CEFR equivalent level B2 or higher, you will be exempted from the English writing test.



What level of Japanese language proficiency is required for the International Admissions?

For April admissions, applicants are required to have passed JLPT N1 or equivalent. For October admissions, Japanese language proficiency is not required at the time of enrollment but any scores from the JLPT or other relevant examinations that students submit will be reviewed. In order to deepen your specialized knowledge, especially if you wish to study in the science field, you will need to attend lectures offered in Japanese at related schools/faculty. In such cases, it is necessary to achieve a level of N2 to N1 in the Japanese Language Proficiency Test.

How will the English proficiency required for the International Admissions be determined?

Applicants who have not been educated in English as their official or primary language of teaching for the last five years will be asked to submit scores from one or more English language qualifications/examinations, such as TOEFL or IELTS, at the time of application. English proficiency will be judged comprehensively based on an interview and the student's high school grades.

I grew up overseas and studied in Japan from junior high school. Should I take the International Admissions or the Domestic Application? I am currently attending an international school in Japan. Am I eligible to apply for the International Admissions?

You can take both the International Admissions and the Domestic Application as long as you meet the application requirements.



Does GDP offer an IB (International Baccalaureate) **Entrance Examination?**

GDP does not hold an IB entrance examination, but highly values IB education and welcomes not only students with an IB qualification but also prospective students and applicants with only a Certificate of Completion. Since the program's inception, many students who were educated at IB schools have enrolled and are deepening their studies in the small-sized class and practical learning environments that are the characteristics of GDP. There are multiple opportunities to take the IB Entrance Examination, and IB scores are also evaluated in the Domestic Application and International Admissions. In both cases, the knowledge students gained from their IB education can be useful in the entrance examinations.
